The first transcontinental railroad, completed in May 10th 1869, connected East Coast with West Coast more than three thousand miles away. Similar to the first lunar landing one hundred years later, the completion of the railroad carried immense symbolism for the United States. But it was more than an abstract symbol; it also physically transform the nation and in turn the state of Utah and the City of Ogden. In this presentation I explore the symbolism and transformation of first Transcontinental Railroad and its impact on Utah and Ogden. I then focus on its human impact and changes to both the physical and cultural landscape of Ogden, ask How is Utah's transcontinental history relevant to Utah's communities today by looking at Union Station's educational archaeological program, *We Dig History*.
